First United Methodist Church Port Neches, Texas

Celebrating 120 Years 1881 - 2001

On September 9, 2001, members of First United Methodist Church celebrate 120 years of faith through worship, special recognition of fifty-year members, a pictorial review of the past, and a fellowship luncheon.

There is little known of the history of Methodism in Port Neches prior to 1880 except that Circuit Rider ministers served the community then known as Grigsby's Bluff. Circuit riders came occasionally to preach, stayed in the homes where services were held, then moved on to other communities. Hazardous conditions were evidenced by the death of one minister, Rev. J. C. Kee, who drowned in the Neches River, and Rev. W. H. Crawford's report of having become lost in a dense fog between Grigsby's Bluff and Taylor's Bayou.

On September 6, 1881, Rev. W. H. Crawford organized the first local church in the home of Mr. and Mrs. William Gentz. Rev. R. W. Thompson was the presiding elder. There were sixteen members from the families of Keith, Smith, Gentz, Beaumont, Remley, Sampson, Cline, Lee, Nelson, and Merriman. Rev. Crawford traveled 200 miles each month to serve Sabine Pass and Terry Missions, which included Orange, Jefferson and Hardin Counties.

Circuit riders continued to hold services in homes until 1885, when a house that stood about the 500 block of Port Neches Avenue was damaged while it was being moved by wagon. Mrs. Margaret Ann Keith purchased the house for \$100 and offered it to be used as a school and a church. For the next nine years the community had a school, Sunday School, and church, where the men sat on one side and the women on the other, worshipping by the light of coal oil lamps.

In 1894, Mr. Bud Smith offered the congregation an acre of land in the center of what is now Port Neches, Texas. The building which was erected on this site served as both church and school until 1911, when Mrs. C. A. Baird gave land for a school and ended the church building's dual role.

Church services were held only once a month, since the minister served Sabine Pass, Deweyville, Port Neches, and Nederland. By 1916, Rev. J. L. Red was holding services twice a month.

Later, when Mr. Smith sold 50 acres of land, including that on which the church stood, to a Mrs. Baxter of Orange, the congregation was faced with a possible need to relocate. Mrs. Baxter sold the acre that held the church building to Dr. William Haizlip of Nederland, who then sold it to the church.

Faced with an agreement to pay their preacher \$125 a year and the additional \$150 indebtedness for the land, the members feared they might lose their church building. Mr. Con Wagner paid off the entire amount and later canceled the debt, giving clear title to the property to the Methodist congregation.

Membership grew rapidly, and in 1919, Mrs. Lola Staffen and Anna Block called a meeting to discuss building a new church. With Mr. W. T. Block presiding, the group pledged \$700. The Texas Company donated an additional \$500. Mr. Bunch was the contractor on the new building; A. C. Bigelow, the architect and Eugene Block, the carpenter. Mr. A. C. Mullins was chairman of the Building Committee, Secretary and Treasurer. Since there was no bank, Mr. Mullins put the building fund money in a heavy sack and tied it high in the thick branches of a chinaberry tree in his yard. The building was constructed on the corner of Main and Nall Streets with a mortgage of \$3,600.

In 1920 Rev. W. E. Hassler was appointed as the first full-time minister for the Methodist Church in Port Neches. During Rev. Hassler's ministry, the first Vacation Bible School in the Texas conference was held in Port Neches. The membership more than doubled, and the Sunday School had 250 enrolled. The first parsonage was built in 1921 at a cost of \$1,800.

In 1948 the old church property was sold. The old church was moved to the new location on Nall Street, and in 1949 construction started on the new church which cost about \$100,000. It was finished in 1950 with a mortgage of \$30,000. Mr. W. T. Block and Mr. Keith were trustees. Mr. Mullins, Mr. Bunch, and Mrs. Wallace Morgan were stewards.

Rev. L. A. Reavis was appointed as pastor in 1950, and under his leadership a beautiful new parsonage was constructed in 1953-54 at a cost of \$28,500.

Rev. F. D. Dawson was appointed as minister in 1954, and under his leadership the mortgage was paid off on the Sanctuary Building. In 1961, the church was completely air conditioned at a cost of \$36,000. Also in 1961, a new wing which contained Fellowship Hall, a parlor, kitchen and other rooms, and an educational building were added through a \$300,000 bond sale that also paid the debt on the parsonage and the air conditioning.

In 1999 an enlarged outer vestibule and canopy were constructed at the main entrance to the sanctuary, and canopies were constructed over the Nall Street Fellowship Hall entrance and Eugene Street sanctuary entrance. A new church sign was erected in 2001.
